Heros Reward's connections look toward Breeders' Cup

The rags to riches story of 2007 Maryland-bred Horse of the Year Heros Reward—an exclaimer who earned more than a half-million dollars last season—could soon add its most exciting chapter yet.

Owner Bob Haynes and trainer Dale Capuano are tentatively aiming for the 6-year-old gelding for the inaugural \$1 million Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint, to be run at Santa Anita on October 25 as part of the two-day Breeders' Cup World Championships.

"It's probably about 50-50 whether we'll end up going," trainer Dale Capuano said in early September.

The deciding factor was expected to be his performance in the Grade 2 Nearctic Stakes on October 4 at Woodbine, a race that Heros Reward won in 2007.

"We'll need a strong performance in the Nearctic—either a win or a real, real good second," said Haynes, who looked forward to writing a \$90,000 check to supplement Heros Reward to the big event. "We don't want him to go to the Breeders' Cup as a pretender. We want to win it for Maryland, and win it for Heros Reward," Haynes added.

A son of former Maryland stallion Partner's Hero, Heros

Reward was a nonentity until last season when he found his calling as a turf sprinter.

Haynes and Capuano claimed Heros Reward from his breeder, Gretchen Mobberley, for \$20,000 in April 2006 at Laurel Park, when he was making his fifth start.

At first he appeared to be a dud—failing to win for a bottom-level, \$5,000 claiming tag at Delaware Park that August. But after Capuano switched him to the turf in October 2006, Heros Reward became a running machine.

A four-race win streak in early 2007 culminated in a thrilling victory in the Baltimore City Turf Sprint before the 2007 Preakness day crowd at Pimlico. And soon Capuano, who has ranked at or near the top of Maryland's trainers' standings for more than two decades, was training the most accomplished runner he'd ever had in his barn.

Capuano got his richest win to date when Heros Reward captured the \$500,000 Nearctic Stakes last fall. The big, long-striding gelding led

Maryland-bred, Maryland Million stakes highlight fall program

Registered Maryland-breds and Maryland Million eligible runners will compete for \$2.23 million in stakes purses during the Laurel Park fall meet that continues until December 27.

The Maryland-bred stakes program includes 11 races, each worth \$50,000 and culminating in the Maryland Juvenile Filly Championship (December 20) and Maryland Juvenile Championship (December 27).

That is in addition to Maryland Million Day, Oc-

tober 4, which offers 12 races with nearly \$1.7 million in purses.

"Despite the harsh economic realities in Maryland, board members of the Maryland Horse Breeders Association [MHBA] and Maryland Million Ltd. [MML] believe that it is important for these programs to continue because they offer such strong incentives for Maryland-bred and Maryland-sired runners," noted MHBA/MML executive director Cricket Goodall.

up to that race with seconds in Woodbine's Scotts Highlander Stakes-G3 and Turf Monster Handicap at Philadelphia Park.

His season's earnings amounted to \$515,826, and at year's end he was voted championship honors in three divisions—older male, sprinter and turf runner—in addition to his Horse of the Year title.

The roll has continued in 2008. Heros Reward returned from a six-month layoff to finish third in the Bob Umphrey Turf Sprint Championship Stakes at Calder in April, then once again did his connections proud on Preakness day, with a hard-fought victory in the same race he won last year, now known as the Old Mutual Turf Sprint.

Dominating scores followed in the Scotts Highlander-G3 (on June 22) and Penn National's Pennsylvania Governor's Cup Handicap (on August 1).

The only downer came in the Turf Monster Handicap at Philadelphia Park on September 1, when Heros Reward was runner-up by four lengths to True to Tradition.

"It was not a disgrace, for sure, and the winner ran a fantastic race," commented Capuano.

Haynes pointed out that Heros Reward, highweighted at 124 pounds in the Turf Monster and giving five pounds to the winner, carried a super-sized amount of lead in his saddle along with his regular rider, Javier Castellano, whose own weight is in the low range. During the running of the race, Heros Reward bobbed and the shifting lead may have made it difficult to right himself over the firm turf.

Still it was Heros Reward's fifth in-the-money finish in five starts this season, boosting his 2008 earnings to \$309,984 (and lifetime total to \$853,600).

This fall marks the fifth anniversary of the passing of Allen's Prospect, who rose to become Maryland's all-time leading sire during an exceptionally prolific career that spanned 17 seasons at the Pons family's Country Life Farm in Bel Air, Md.

But Allen's Prospect's legacy continues to expand. His 4-year-old daughter All Giving dominated Maryland-bred fillies and mares in the \$50,000 Alma North Stakes at Timonium on August 30.

Owned by Concepts Unlimited Stable (Tony Smith) and Catherine J. Smith, and trained by Flint Stites, All Giving—from her sire's final

crop—was getting her third stakes win of the season.

Sharing high weight of 124 pounds with runner-up and 1.3-1 favorite La Chica Rica, All Giving rushed to an early lead in the six and a half-furlong Alma North and showed the way through fractions of :23.89, :47.99 and 1:11.89 before crossing the wire in 1:16.79. The 9-5 second choice in the field of six, All Giving was ridden to victory by Jonathan Joyce.

La Chica Rica held a six and a half-length advantage over Story of a Lion, who was followed by Long Time Gone, Where's the Love and Firm Dollar.

All Giving rose to the fore with a victory against Maryland-breds in the Conniver Stakes this past March and starred in the The Very One

Stakes on the undercard of the Black-Eyed Susan Stakes-G2 on May 16 at Pimlico. She has won nine of 22 starts and earned \$258,900.

Bred by Towson, Md., attorney Morris Balsler in the name of Baywood LLC, All Giving was sold by her breeder for \$19,000 at the 2005 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale, and resold the following year at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic May sale of 2-year-olds in training, where her present connections bought her for \$75,000. She is the sixth foal and third stakes performer for her dam, Slew the Dragoness (by Slew City Slew), who until All Giving came along was best represented by War Native (\$96,890, Rollicking S, etc.).

The \$50,000 Taking Risks Stakes, a Maryland Fund event for 3-year-olds and up, traditionally attracts classy older performers to Timonium, and this year's edition, on Labor Day (September 1), was no exception.

P. Kerney, who captured the Taking Risks in 2006 and '07, came back in search of a three-peat at the age of 7, and 6-year-old Celtic Innis sought to extend his stakes record.

The smart money, however, was on Five Steps, a 7-year-old who just two weeks earlier contested the Grade 3 Philip

H. Iselin Stakes at Monmouth Park.

Five Steps, carrying 124 pounds, gave six pounds to each of his five rivals in the Taking Risks. But he lived up to his 1.1-1 favoritism under jockey J.D. Acosta, rallying four-wide nearing the stretch in the six and a half-furlong stakes and prevailing by a length and a half over Celtic Innis. P. Kerney was two lengths back in third.

Completing the order of finish were Great Seneca, Lil Moon Man and Poppy's Punkin. Final time was 1:16.84.

It was the fourth career stakes win—and third win in four starts this year—for Five Steps, who campaigns as a homebred for William R. Harris and is trained by Chris Grove.

After finishing second in last year's Maryland Million Classic (won by Evil Storm), Five Steps was given an

eight-month layoff. He hit the ground running with a victory in allowance company at Charles Town on June 22, and then turned in a big performance to win the R.R.M. Carpenter Memorial Handicap on July 12 at Delaware Park, scoring by five and a quarter lengths and earning a 103 Beyer speed figure. Stepped up to the Iselin after that, he finished seventh in a field of eight.

The Taking Risks boosted Five Steps's career earnings to \$398,746 from 19 starts.

A son of Yarrow Brae, who stands at Allen and Audrey Murray's Murmur Farm in Darlington, Md., Five Steps was produced by the Thirty Eight Paces mare Thirty Eight Steps, whose earlier offspring include stakes winners Deer Run (\$408,530, Maryland Million Sprint H, Fire Plug S, 2nd Frank J. De Francis Memorial Dash-G1, etc.) and Norstep (\$229,845, Politely S, etc.).

Robert E. Meyerhoff's Fitzhugh LLC homebreds dominated the Twixt Stakes on August 9, sweeping the first three places as a heavily favored entry. Still the race was not without some disappointment for Richard W. (Dickie) Small, who trains the threesome.

Pissarro, a lightly raced daughter of Empire Maker making her stakes debut,

crossed the wire first, a neck in front of her stablemate Hartigan. The victory would have meant a big step up in black type for Pissarro, who went into the Twixt with a record of two wins and two seconds in her four career starts dating back to last May.

Hartigan, on the other hand, had already accumulated a wealth of stakes credentials—in 10 previous starts she had three stakes wins and four stakes placings.

Small stood by as Jozbin Santana, who was aboard Hartigan, lodged a claim of foul against Josue Arce, who rode Pissarro, for interference through the stretch. After a brief review by the stewards, Hartigan was declared the winner, Pissarro was disqualified to second, and the Fitzhugh filly Inventive (twice stakes-placed but also looking for her first stakes win) remained third.

Small has no doubt that the better filly came out the official loser.

“Pissarro has big-time talent. She is sort of just learning the game,” the trainer said. Hartigan, by contrast, is “not particularly talented. Hartigan just finds a way to win. She is tough.”

The Meyerhoff runners earned \$45,500 of the \$50,000 purse.

Sent off at odds of .50-1, the entymates rallied through the stretch, with Inventive reaching the wire four and three-quarters lengths behind the top two. Final time was 1:38.09. Completing the field were All Around, Ask the Moon and She’s So Proud.

Hartigan, who exited the Twixt with a career bankroll of \$194,300, descends from accomplished Meyerhoff-bred runners on both sides of her pedigree. Her sire, Include (a son of Meyerhoff’s Grade 1 winner and leading sire Broad Brush, the 1986 and ’87 Maryland-bred Horse of the Year), was a Grade 1-winning millionaire who took honors as Maryland-bred Horse of the Year in 2001.

On the dam’s side Hartigan descends from the stellar

bloodline of Dynamic Star (Silent Screen—Cynderdyne, by What Luck), whom Meyerhoff bought for \$200,000 at the 1988 Keeneland November sale.

Dynamic Star was carrying her first foal, a Deputy Minister filly, when she joined the broodmare band at Meyerhoff’s Fitzhugh Farm in Phoenix, Md. That filly, Star Minister, carried Meyerhoff’s colors to victory in seven stakes, including the Grade 2 Cotillion Handicap, and earned \$458,650. A stakes winner each year she raced, at 2, 3 and 4, Star Minister was a Maryland-bred divisional champion in each of her first two seasons of competition (1991 and ’92).

Dynamic Star, honored as Maryland’s broodmare of the year in 1999, went on to produce four more stakes performers for Meyerhoff, led by stakes winners Stellar Brush (1996, Broad Brush; \$626,830, Ohio Derby-G2, etc.) and Dynamic Deputy (2002, Deputy Minister; \$344,020, Shine Again S, 2nd Delaware H-G2, etc.).

Meanwhile, Star Minister became a stakes producer as the dam of Concerned Minister (1997, Concern; \$266,060, Tenacious H, etc.)

Hartigan is the first foal from Star Minister’s unraced daughter Star Number (2000, Polish Numbers).

Star Number, still in production at Meyerhoff’s Fitzhugh Farm in Phoenix, Md., has an unraced 2-year-old Distorted Humor filly, Nervous Laughter, whom Meyerhoff sold for \$65,000 at the 2007 Keeneland September Yearling sale. She produced full siblings to Hartigan in each of the last two seasons (a colt in 2007 and filly in ’08) and is back in foal for 2009 to Include.

Trainer Dale Capuano may be saying seeyouantsantaanita with Heros Reward (see article on page 1). Meanwhile, his 3-year-old colt Seeyouinthecity is gathering momentum of his own.

Bred and owned by See You Stable, a partnership of Capuano and Columbia, Md.-based attorney Lou Ulman, Seeyouinthecity delivered a breakout performance in the Humphrey S. Finney Stakes on August 16.

Making his second start of the season in the nine-furlong turf stakes for Maryland-breds, Seeyouinthecity assumed an early lead under jockey Malcolm Franklin, opened up a sizable margin through the stretch, and held off rallying favorite Baltimore Bob by a length and a half.

Second choice in the field of six, Seeyouinthecity paid \$7 to win after stopping the timer in 1:48.06. Completing the order of finish were Knight in Armour, Blue’s Baby Boy, Benny Havens and Freedom’s Road.

Seeyouinthecity, who upped his career total to \$69,930, had proven useful, if unspectacular, in his five earlier starts, all but one on the turf. He scored a frontrunning six-length victory in maiden special weight company at

a mile and a sixteenth in his third outing last October at Laurel and made one more start, finishing third over an off-track at Charles Town in December, before being sidelined by a knee chip.

He made his season’s debut in allowance company at Colonial Downs on July 20, and scored easily in that five and a half-furlong event.

On August 30, Seeyouinthecity competed in Delaware Park’s \$500,000 Kent Breeders’ Cup Stakes-G3 and at odds of more than 23-1 nearly stole the mile and an eighth turf test, setting all the fractions before giving way in the shadow of the wire. He finished fourth, earning \$30,000 for the effort.

Seeyouinthecity (by Slew City Slew) is the third foal produced by Lux Marquet, a daughter of Marquetry whom Capuano and Ulman claimed for \$25,000 at Pimlico in May 2001.

Lux Marquet, then 3, was making her first start when Capuano dropped the claim slip, and she never raced again. But Capuano and Ulman (who is a longtime member and former chairman of the Maryland Racing Commission) switched easily into their fallback plan, retiring her as a broodmare.

Bred by Glade Valley Farms, Lux Marquet had obvious potential in the breeding shed. Her dam, Luxurious Gal (Buckpasser—Dictates, by Bold Ruler), produced three

stakes horses, including the multiple stakes-winning Majestic Light gelding Major Lux, who won the Finney Stakes in 1990 (a year in which the race was taken off the turf).

Lux Marquet's broodmare career has followed a tortuous path. The mare's three other foals of racing age have failed to break their maidens.

Her 2003 Prized gelding, Seeyouwinaprize, retired after a dozen starts for the See You partners. And her 2004 Millennium Wind filly, D'lux

Wind, fared even worse after Capuano and Ulman sold her for \$13,000 at the 2005 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Eastern Fall Yearling sale.

What's more, Capuano holds no great hopes for Lux Marquet's current 2-year-old colt Tough As Rocky (by Rock Slide), who is winless in his first three starts for See You Stable.

Lux Marquet's value as a broodmare plummeted to zero in 2006, however, when she developed blood incompat-

ibility problems that threatened the life of her foal—hence the name Tough As Rocky. After footing large veterinary bills for that foal, Capuano and Ulman had had enough.

Lux Marquet had been a year-round boarder at Jerry and Laurie Calhoun's Summer Wind Farm in Libertytown, Md.

After nursing Rocky through his illness, Laurie Calhoun was assigned the delicate task of finding a new home for the mare.

In December 2006, Lux Marquet was given away to equine veterinarian Vito DelVento and Kelly Hawkins, who operate Hedgeland Farm in Leesburg, Va. The new owners reported the birth of a healthy Domestic Dispute filly last March. And a few months later Calhoun was delighted to be able to tell them that Lux Marquet has become a stakes producer.

Mid-Atlantic Animal Import Center Feasibility Study released

From the Maryland Department of Agriculture

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's Maryland Horse Industry Board has released the Mid-Atlantic Animal Import Center Feasibility Study, which identified the Midfield Cargo Complex of the Thurgood Marshall Baltimore-Washington International Airport as the best potential site for the center.

"The time it takes to ship a horse overseas begins from the time that animal leaves the barn to the time it plants its hoof in the soil of its new home. Adding a five-to-15 hour van ride on top of the time in flight is not cost effective and causes additional

stress on the animals being shipped," said Agriculture Secretary Roger Richardson. "A permanent Mid-Atlantic Animal Import and Export Center could reduce the cost of shipment for horse owners and buyers, and reduce the stress on transported horses thereby increasing the overall condition and productivity of animals shipped overseas."

The study also detailed the process of importing and exporting horses to and from the U.S. Currently, only three permanent centers accept horses for importation in the U.S.

The center was deemed feasible if coupled with another

entity such as a state laboratory or animal health center. Due to the seasonality of the shipment of horses, with the strongest peaks occurring between the months of December and January, operating the facility jointly with another entity could better utilize staff, optimize operations and create new jobs and economic impact for the region.

The study was funded by a combination of public and private, federal and state entities including the USDA through the Federal-State Marketing Improvement Program, the Maryland Department of Agriculture, the Maryland Horse

Industry Board and the Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development. The study was conducted by the private firm Owl Creek Consulting of Berlin, Md., in cooperation with the Business, Economic, and Community Outreach Network of the Franklin P. Perdue School of Business at Salisbury University.
